# Kindergarten Daily Routine

- Morning Work (Daily) We reserve this time for community building. Students
  play games, draw, write and read with one another.
- Morning Meeting (Daily) We start our day as a whole class to build our social emotional skills.
- Language Arts (120 minutes/ Daily)
  - Phonics- letter/sound relationships, handwriting/letter formation, blending
  - Writing- phonetic spelling, punctuation, sentence structure (uppercase/lowercase letters), key details, etc.
  - Reading- teacher read alouds, comprehension, reflection, connections
  - Guided Phonics/Reading Groups- leveled small groups to work on letter/sound recognition, phonics and reading skills
- **Specials** (45 minutes/day)
- Math (60 minutes/Daily) Math in Focus and leveled small groups
- Social Studies/ Science (35 minutes)
- Exploration/STEM (20 minutes/Daily)



#### **New To NC Public Schools:**

All children entering Kindergarten or public schools for the first time are required to present the completed North Carolina Health Assessment Transmittal form on or before the first day of attendance. Below is the link to the Health Assessment form.

#### Immunizations:

All Union Day School students must have a complete record of immunizations on file signed by a physician or bearing a physician stamp prior to the first day of school. Parents will be notified when the child does not meet immunization requirements. The parents or guardians have 30 days from the child's first day of attendance to provide the required up to date immunizations. ### Attendance

#### Why It Matters!

If children don't show up for school regularly, they miss out on fundamental reading and math skills and the chance to build a habit of good attendance that will carry them into college and careers.

Preliminary data from a California study found that children who were chronically absent in kindergarten and 1st grade were far less likely to read proficiently at the end of 3rd grade.

#### Who Is Affected?

Kindergarten and 1st grade classes often have absenteeism rates as high as those in high school. Many of these absences are excused, but they still add up to lost time in the classroom.

**1 in 10 kids** in kindergarten and 1st grade are chronically absent. In some schools, it's as high as 1 in 4.

Thank you for coming! We are happy to have you! I am the Lower School Curriculum Specialist. To serve your student's individual academic needs, in reading and math, we administer three benchmark assessments each year (fall, winter, spring). These assessments are completed on the computer with audio instructions. They are developed by the Northwest Evaluation Association (NWEA), a global not-for-profit educational services organization, that partners with over 3,500 educational organizations worldwide to provide research-based adaptive assessments, professional development, and research services. NWEA's assessments are called Measures of Academic Progress (MAP®). MAP results provide an idea of how your student is performing on a national level, in comparison to their grade level peers and in comparison to their homeroom classmates. These results will be shared with you shortly after they are received.
